Therefore, if the price is \$20.00, the profit is the same as for \$9.99 because of the change in the royalty scheme. \$2.99 is the lowest price for the 70% scheme, but with the 35% scheme, the price can be \$0.99 to \$200.00.

Amazon also cuts into the royalty in the name of storage. They call it a delivery fee for a Kindle book which is delivered electronically. High quality photographs reduce the royalty on each book. That is why the Watson books, especially the travel books with lots of photographs, are all \$9.99 regardless of length.

Free Alberta Libre, the shortest Watson book is appropriately priced at \$2.99. The longer Watson books, like the nonfiction manuals for the card game of bridge called Two Over One and Standard Canadian and like the Watson novel, The Nuu Runner: A Conservative Manifesto, should be priced over twice as much as some as the shorter books like Patagonia Papers, Papers in the Wastebasket and Poesia of Songs Unsung, but to get the 70% royalty scheme, they are all on special at \$9.99.
